Greetings, fellow neighbors!

We are so pleased to share what Fort Wayne neighbors have done during NeighborLink's 2023-2024 fiscal year. First, praise and thanks be to our God and Father, and to His Son, Jesus Christ. We have seen new relationships and generosity in the good works completed by neighbors who serve in our city. At NeighborLink, we believe this kind of service is sourced in Jesus, who modeled humble service to the "least of these." His death brings forgiveness, and His resurrected life frees us and releases us to serve one another humbly in love. In the pages that follow, you'll see powerful stories of how our neighbors' desperate hardships were completely satisfied by loving neighbors. Oftentimes, these good deeds changed the course of people's lives, providing refreshing and beautiful examples of God's goodness and generosity.

You will also learn about uniquely motivated neighbors and groups of neighbors, who we refer to as "Stewards," who serve in Fort Wayne and other communities. Stewards leverage the NeighborLink platform to meet their vulnerable neighbors, join up with fellow neighbors desiring to serve, and bring humble service to reveal God's goodness. You will hear about the Carpenter's Sons, who put God's love into action within Fort Wayne. Just last year, Carpenter's Sons completed over 659 projects posted on the NeighborLink site, including 135 wheelchair ramp builds or repairs for those lacking safe and dependable access to their homes.

You will learn about a new partnership with our friends at AWS Foundation, the Accessibility Projects Program, which addresses access issues facing our intellectually and physically challenged neighbors. You'll be encouraged as you hear from Halie, and the direct and profound impact that volunteers and contractors participating in this partnership have had on her and her husband's lives.

You will hear how funds received and unspent during the COVID pandemic were used to meet needs for the most challenging projects needing funding and the impact upon neighbors with a fixed income. You will hear about Camp NeighborLink, an intensive 3-day serving experience put together by the NeighborLink staff that invited Fort Wayne neighbors to gather, pray, and go out to serve neighbors who requested assistance. Similarly, our staff partnered with Amp Lab, a half-day high school program for 11th and 12th graders, to join them in their journey of neighboring within the community around Electric Works.

You will hear about Brett Meyer, a former board member who engineered the current website used by NeighborLink. Brett joined our staff this past year and on January 1, became a full-time employee. Brett brings tremendous depth and a servant's heart to our technology and assists servant leaders in other communities in developing access to the NeighborLink platform to connect those in need with those looking to serve.

You will meet the incredible staff of NeighborLink, who work tirelessly behind the scenes, serving on the front lines with Fort Wayne's most challenged neighbors, providing hope, prayer, and connections with those who serve in our city. They are truly a gift from God to our city, and each has experienced God's transforming love as they daily engage in practical, neighbor-to-neighbor expressions of God's love.

Be encouraged! Neighbors who serve, donors, partner churches, agencies, and businesses are changing the cultural landscape in our city and are bringing God's light and hope to our neighbors.

BREAKING BARRIERS:

How the AWS Accessibility Projects Program is Changing Lives

At NeighborLink, we believe that everyone deserves to feel safe and independent in their own home. Yet, for many neighbors living with lifelong disabilities, everyday tasks—such as bathing, cooking, or moving between rooms—can be daunting or even dangerous.

That's why we partnered with the AWS Foundation to launch the AWS Accessibility Projects Program, an initiative focused on removing barriers and making homes more accessible for those facing mobility challenges.

Through this program, we've provided critical renovations such as roll-in showers, grab bars, widened doorways, and safer flooring—modifications that allow individuals to navigate their homes with greater ease and dignity. These are not just home improvements; they are life-changing solutions that give families peace of mind and help neighbors regain their independence.

Eligibility for the program focuses on homeowners with lifelong and/or enduring physical or intellectual disabilities. From the initial assessment of the household's interior to the final follow-up visit, NeighborLink collaborates with skilled contractors to implement solutions that truly transform lives. But our work doesn't stop with construction—we remain committed to ensuring that every modification serves its intended purpose and provides long-term benefits.

Thanks to the support of the AWS Foundation and our compassionate community, we are able to take on more large-scale projects than ever before. Together, we're building a more inclusive and supportive community—one home at a time.

Finding Safety and Independence at Home

For Halie Brown and her husband, everyday tasks came with uncertainty and risk. Both face physical disabilities, and navigating their outdated bathroom was more than just a challenge—it was a danger. Each day, they worried that a simple routine, like getting ready in the morning, could lead to a fall.

The cost of renovations made a safe, accessible bathroom feel out of reach. However, the AWS Accessibility Projects Program made that possible. By installing a walk-in shower and making the space wheelchair-accessible, Halie now has peace of mind. These renovations were more than just functional—they were personal.

"I came home to the most beautiful bathroom. I do not often find myself speechless, but this has me speechless. My heart is overwhelmed with gratitude and joy for everyone involved in helping to make my bathroom more accessible for me. The contractors did such a fantastic job and even made it more special by adding my favorite color to the wall. The new floor pattern is beautiful, and they even took a few special resin pieces I had around and placed them in the perfect places," she said.

For Halie, this project was about more than just safety—it was about dignity, independence, and the ability to move freely in her own home. Thanks to this transformation, Halie and her husband now have a space that allows them to live with comfort and confidence without the daily fear of injury.

At NeighborLink, we believe each home should be a place of security, not struggle. With the support of AWS and our dedicated community, we're committed to breaking down barriers so neighbors like Halie can live with the safety, freedom, and peace they deserve.





THE CARPENTER'S SONS

Building More Than Ramps

Every Tuesday morning, a group of retired men and women gather to put their faith into action. They are the Carpenter's Sons, a ministry of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, and they have dedicated their time and skills to serving low-income homeowners in various ways, including NeighborLink's wheelchair ramp program. Their work provides far more than accessibility; it also restores independence and dignity to individuals who might otherwise be trapped in their own homes.

Carpenter's Sons completed 659 projects during our last fiscal year, including 135 wheelchair ramp builds or repairs. These projects directly impact older adults and individuals with disabilities, ensuring they can move safely in and out of their homes.

For the volunteers, this work is more than just construction—it's a calling. Mark Schmidt, a long-time volunteer, describes why this work is so important: "We're in a season of life where we have the time and health to dedicate. We also believe that God has given each of us certain abilities, and volunteering is a way to honor that gift."

Many Carpenter's Sons volunteers have years of experience in skilled trades, but others start with only a willingness to help. The key, according to Schmidt, is a willingness to learn. "Many of us started with basic abilities and developed skills through experience. Overcoming insecurities and taking on new challenges is what makes neighboring a lifestyle."



Beyond the physical labor, the Carpenter's Sons hope their work leaves a deeper impact. They want to meet tangible needs but also see their service as a demonstration of love in action. "We hope to make life easier for our neighbors while setting an example of what the Christian life looks like: one of service, faithfulness, and using our abilities for good."

These ramps and repairs provide security, stability, and a renewed sense of belonging for the homeowners they serve. For the volunteers, it's a way to live out their faith and build something that lasts—both in the structures they create and the lives they touch.



AMP LAB

Empowering Students, Strengthening Our Community

At Amp Lab @ Electric Works, students are encouraged to solve real problems for real people. Since 2022, NeighborLink has been proud to partner with Amp Lab, providing students with hands-on service opportunities that allow them to contribute meaningfully to their community while gaining real-world experience.

This partnership is more than a one-time service project—it's a continuous collaboration that empowers students to make an impact. Jeff Roberts, Amp Lab's Community Building Coach, emphasizes the importance of these experiences: "We want our students to see how their skills and energy can make a real difference. Partnering with NeighborLink allows them to engage directly with their community and develop a deeper sense of responsibility and service."

Each year, Amp Lab students participate in various service projects with NeighborLink. From raking leaves and cleaning up parks to helping construct wheelchair ramps and assisting homeowners with yard work, their involvement has been wide-ranging and deeply impactful.

One of the most inspiring moments of the partnership came when all 400 Amp Lab students participated in a community-wide effort, going door to door in the neighborhoods around Electric Works to distribute NeighborLink door hangers. Their outreach helped raise awareness of our mission and connected more residents with the support they needed.

Beyond the physical tasks, these projects are shaping future leaders. Students don't just gain volunteer hours but develop a lifelong understanding of the power of community engagement. They see firsthand that small actions—like clearing a yard or building a ramp—can profoundly impact someone's quality of life.

As this partnership continues to grow, NeighborLink and Amp Lab remain committed to creating opportunities where students can learn, serve, and build a stronger, more connected Fort Wayne. "It's about more than just the work. It's about fostering a mindset of service that lasts long after their time at Amp Lab," says Roberts.

With each new project, Amp Lab students are proving that young people have the power to change their communities for the better—one neighbor at a time.

For these young leaders, Camp NeighborLink was more than just a day of service—it was a transformative experience.

Neighbors in Hospitality and Community



BRINGING WARMTH TOOUR NEIGHBORS:

The Impact of Our HVAC Program



Winter in our region can be brutal, and for many homeowners, a failing furnace is a crisis, not just an inconvenience. That's why NeighborLink's HVAC Program has remained a vital part of our mission for the last eight years, ensuring that families in need stay warm during the coldest months.

During the past winter season, we completed 17 HVAC projects, including 5 furnace replacements and 12 repairs, totaling \$21,732 in project costs. Thanks to homeowner contributions and proceeds from our hydrant painting program, the bottom-line cost of the program was reduced to \$18,077. Additionally, when donors fund projects at NeighborLink, it helps provide direct support for projects like these.

But beyond the numbers, this program represents real lives changed. Jeff Shatto, NeighborLink's Director of Mobilization, reflected on the impact: "Being good neighbors and helping one another when in need... that's why we do what we do." We are especially grateful to Brockman Heating & Air Conditioning, whose partnership has been instrumental in stretching our resources. By prioritizing safe repairs whenever possible rather than pushing replacements, Brockman has helped us serve more homeowners without exhausting our budget too quickly.

Additionally, we want to acknowledge Flowtech, which generously donated a furnace for a neighbor in serious need. Their commitment to going above and beyond made a lasting impact.

Our HVAC program is about more than just furnaces—it's about making sure people are cared for when they need it most.. As we look ahead, we remain committed to keeping homes warm and serving our neighbors with love and dignity.

Brett Meyer

One of NeighborLink's core differentiators is how it leverages technology to eliminate the barriers between those who need help and those who can provide it. NeighborLink is investing in its webbased platform like never before, bringing all technology operations in-house to enhance local effectiveness and national expansion. At the heart of this effort is Brett Meyer, our Director of Technology and Growth, whose leadership is driving innovation to better connect neighbors and volunteers.

Brett's connection to NeighborLink runs deep. Since 2009, he has been a dedicated volunteer. He also developed our previous website and helped in the early stages of our expansion into an affiliate network, which saw 15 US cities adopt the NeighborLink platform since 2008. As an official team member, Brett brings continuity and fresh vision to our tech initiatives.

Before stepping into this role, Brett founded Impact Upgrade, a tech company with engineers from leading organizations like Disney, Twilio, and the Department of Defense. His expertise ensures that NeighborLink's platform operates with efficiency, security, and scalability, preparing us for future growth while safeguarding the trust of those we serve.



This shift isn't just about upgrading software but strengthening connections. By managing our technology in-house, we can innovate faster, ensure greater accessibility, and equip volunteers to respond more efficiently to neighbors in need.


With Brett's leadership, NeighborLink's digital tools are being refined to maximize impact in Fort Wayne and beyond. In the last few months, we've launched new communities in Mercer County, Ohio; Elkhart, Indiana; Dallas/Fort Worth, Texas; and Noble County, Indiana, with more than 25 other partnerships in development. By simplifying the process through a three-tiered playbook and leaning into accessible tools like text messaging, we're building a national movement—making it easier than ever for neighbors to show up for one another.



In 2024, volunteers painted 515 fire hydrants across Fort Wayne in partnership with the City of Fort Wayne. For every hydrant painted, the City donates \$5\$ to NeighborLink, resulting in a total of \$2,575\$ raised to support our Winter Furnace Program. Thank you to the many groups and individuals who grabbed a paintbrush and helped keep our neighbors warm. Every brushstroke makes a difference!

2024: FINANCIALS & EXPLANATIONS

In FY23-24, NeighborLink made a strategic and mission-driven decision to reinvest surplus funds from prior years to meet the growing needs of our neighbors. Most notably, this allowed us to bring back our critical roof repair program—an initiative we paused in past years due to funding limitations. Roof repairs are among the most urgent and costly needs we encounter, and their return represents a tangible expansion of how we care for vulnerable homeowners in Fort Wayne.

This board-approved investment resulted in a planned deficit of \$167,000, one we embraced with full awareness and intention. We understood that serving our neighbors in deeper and more sustainable ways would require stepping forward with bold generosity, even when it stretched our resources. This approach reflects a defining trait of our organization: a willingness to lead with love and respond when the need is great.

Throughout this period, we remained grounded in financial responsibility. Our board continues to guide a long-term strategy to balance growth and stewardship. This includes prioritizing targeted grant opportunities, cultivating new donor partnerships, and responsibly pacing service expansion to match available resources.

We are grateful for your continued support as we stretch to serve more neighbors with compassion and excellence. Every dollar given, every volunteer hour served, and every word of encouragement helps us stand in the gap between need and hope. Together, we are creating safe, stable homes—and stronger communities—across Fort Wayne.
